

EPIPHANY BOOK STUDY: READING WHILE BLACK

Beginning on January 16, 2022 after the 10 A.M. service and going through Epiphany, Fr. Bailey will be leading a study on "Reading While Black: African American Interpretation as an Exercise in Hope" by The Rev. Dr. Esau McCaulley. Dr. McCaulley who teaches New Testament at Wheaton College. His book is part of the major strand of his work - helping white Christians and academics understand that there are other ways to hear and interpret the stories of Scripture. Specifically, how do

other cultures - in this case, African-Americans - read the stories from their own experiences? How can we better listen to these experiences? And how can we take these unique interpretations and grow to greater unity as Christians while more deeply appreciating our God-given diversity?

This class will give us the chance to grow in our understanding of the Scriptures, challenge some of our preconceptions, and allow us to hear the richness of diversity within our own parish but also appreciating the perspective of others' stories.
